


- Easy identification of the 5 Itsy Bitsy Skills and ways to use them to develop early literacy skills.

ITSY BITSY BUG GAMES

Here are a few suggestions of things to do while completing your Game Board!

- Make up a song about everyday activities to sing with your child, like, "Drink, drink, drink your milk..." sung to the tune of Row, Row, Row your Boat — or "Now it's time for getting dressed..." to the tune of Mary Had a Little Lamb.
- Spread out on a blanket or towel (inside or outside) and pretend to have a picnic or day at the beach. Talk about what you would need and like to take.
- Use empty boxes as building blocks and let your child play by stacking them and then knocking the stack over. Use phrases like, "all fall down" to describe what is happening.
- Supply your child with plastic cups and containers in the bathtub.
 Let the child fill and empty them—and don't be afraid to play, too!
- Give your child a chance to experience new sensations bare feet in the grass, playing with sand or cornmeal, "painting" with water on the sidewalk, crumbling paper to use as a ball.



SKILLS & ACTIVITIES

5 Literacy Skills and Activities to Get Your Child Ready to Read!

Reading together increases vocabulary and general knowledge. Children who enjoy being read to develop an interest in reading and want to learn to read themselves. A child's interest in reading is an important predictor of later success.



Songs help children develop listening skills and pay attention to the rhythms and rhymes

of spoken language. Singing slows down language so children can hear the different sounds that make up words.




Some of the best kinds of play are unstructured, when children can use their imagination

and create stories that develop important narrative skills. Ask your child to "read" a book you've read together many times and tell you a story. This develops language skills.



As they scribble and draw, children develop the fine


motor skills they need to hold a pencil or crayon and write letters and words. Provide many opportunities to draw and write. Talk to your children about what they draw and write captions or stories together.





Make sure your child has lots of opportunities to talk with you, not just listen to you talk. Stretch your child's vocabulary by repeating what your child says and by using new words. Respond to what your child says and extend the conversation.
